Kali Huettl, "Making Her Dream a Reality"

I have had the pleasure of knowing Kali Huettl for three years. Kali is a resident from HACM's scattered site program and graduated from Riverside University High School this past spring with a 3.5 GPA. In June, HACM The Education Initiative will continue to offer programs and honored her as the 2013 Student of the Year during HACM's Student Recognition Awards ceremony. Kali also received the news that she was one of three Gates Millennium Scholars from the Milwaukee Public Schools District, one of only 1,000 students in the U.S. to achieve that honor. University.

The award pays for students' unmet financial needs in college and graduate school as well as professional development services. College costs can run at least \$35,000/year for four years of undergrad education and \$40,000/year for postgraduate coursework, so the total scholarship could be worth more than \$300,000. Kali plans to be a Nurse Practitioner and then would like to return to Milwaukee to establish a free medical clinic, thus giving back to her community.

Kali's advice to HACM students and parents alike is, "Hope is good, but you need a blueprint, a goal, a plan, a burning desire, realistic objectives to reach your goal and marrell Sinch most importantly, ACTION!"

HACM'S 2013 Summer Super Reader Challenge



Read! Move! Learn!

The Education Initiative 2013 Summer Super Reader Challenge enhanced children's reading this year by incorporating structured physical activities in between fifteen

minutes of daily reading. Education Specialist Assistant Tracy Revels, who spearheaded the summer program, stated, "*The summer reading challenge enhanced reading skills, improved proficiencies and encouraged active healthy lifestyles in young children.*"

A combined total of <u>**118.5 hours**</u> of reading was tracked from about twenty participants during the Monday through Thursday program, from June 24[,] through August 15, 2013.



Literacy activities paralleled school curriculum in that participants became familiar with the proper use a dictionary which defined new vocabulary words gleaned during the activities. The students visited Milwaukee museums as well as the Chicago Museum of Science and Industry. Other visits included the Milwaukee Public Library and for adventure, participants learned basic golf fundamentals offered by PGA's First Tee-Bridging the Gap program. Students enjoyed nutritional lunches at Dr. Martin Luther King Park, which allowed them to stretch and unwind after keeping their brains sharp during the summer break.











As part of the HACM Education Initiative, students from Highland and Scattered Site Homes attended enrichment classes for one week from July 8 - 12 on the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee (UWM) campus. Each year, the UWM Pre-College for Teens/Kids Program acclimates youth to academic surroundings and inspires them to achieve a quality education. Participants completed 20 hours of

classes, including a course named "Build Your Own Business."

Students created their own company, identified the product and developed advertising and marketing strategies. Students, through the Healthy Habits course, learned about wellness tips that promote healthier lifestyle choices. The UWM College for Teens is an excellent program for children in 6th through 12th grades that enhances, inspires and enriches a student's pursuit



in achieving a quality education. Upon completion, the attendees received UWM certificates of completion and took a tour of the UW-Milwaukee campus. The students reported that they had an AMAZING time!
