HACM Education Initiative Wins 2010 MANDI Awards


Local Initiatives Support Corp. (LISC) awarded HACM's Education Initiative the PNC Bank Trail Blazer Award during the 11th MANDI

Neighborhood Development Innovation) Award, held on Thursday, March 18, 2010. The PNC Bank Trail Blazer Award recognizes a community development project or program that represents a new approach to an old problem, opens up a path for others to follow, and showcases innovation, creativity, sustainability, and effectiveness in addressing a longstanding community concern. The award recognized the Education Initiative's impact on school attendance and graduation rates among youth living in HACM's Highland Homes and Scattered Sites homes. Since 2006, no child has dropped out of school, and during the past two years, 100% of high school seniors have graduated. Sixty percent of 2009 graduates have gone on to college. Education Specialist Darrell Finch and three Highland Homes youth: Tydrelle, Trequjaun and Quinton Washington took to the stage at the Pfister Hotel to receive the award on behalf of the Housing Authority. Mr. Finch acknowledged Mayor Tom Barrett, Common Council President and HACM Board Chair Willie Hines, Jr., for their faith in the potential of a program that was untested. "Beginning in 2004 with Executive Director Tony Pérez's vision that HACM could improve the educational lives of youth living in public housing, the Education Initiative has developed into a successful program model that unites the interests of parents, youth, schools and HACM," said Mr. Finch. His greatest praise goes to the parents and youths who commit to educational achievement. "They inspire me to keep pushing for more," said Finch. "We want each child to build a successful, satisfying life, and the Education Initiative has enabled us to work together towards that goal."



Mayor Barrett recognizes HACM Education Initiative

During his "State of the City" address on February 15, 2010, Mayor Barrett lauded the successful efforts of the Housing Authority's Education Initiative to help kids graduate high school and improve educational outcomes. The Mayor specifically recognized Secretary-Executive Director Tony Pérez and Education Specialist Darrell Finch, who received an enthusiastic standing ovation from the large crowd. As the Mayor stated, "Most of last year's graduates went on to college. This year, all but one of the twenty-four high school seniors enrolled in the program are on track to graduate, and we are working on that one." The Education Initiative's goal is to ensure that every child in the program finds

educational success as a foundation to a strong future.

HACM Youth Attend Pre-college Summer Opportunities Fair

On Saturday, March 13, as part of the Housing Authority's Education Initiative, 20 high school and middle school students attended the Pre-College Summer Opportunities Fair at Marquette University. Pre-college programs throughout Wisconsin converged on the beautiful Marquette campus to disseminate information on enrollment opportunities, college life, and scholarships. Some of the college/university participants were UW-Platteville, UW-Milwaukee, UW-Stevens Point, Milwaukee School of Engineering, UW-

Wisconsin, UW-Eau Claire, UW-La Crosse, UW-Whitewater, and Carroll College. Students also toured the Marquette campus and met with representatives working in the fields of Architecture, Engineering, Business, Law, Art, Music and Nursing. Pre-college programs allow young students to use their summer months to learn about college life, develop their academic goals, and strengthen their resolve to achieve a quality education. Students who are eligible for free or reduced price lunch qualify for a scholarship provided by the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction. According to Education Specialist Darrell Finch, "The programs are fun and an excellent way to acclimate HACM students to an academic environment that will assist them in life skills, career planning, and college preparation, all at little or no cost to the youth and their families."

2010 Student Recognition Awards



The Housing Authority of the City of Milwaukee (HACM)'s Education Initiative celebrated achievements among its students at the annual Student Recognition Awards on June 22, 2010. The event was held at the Hillside Family Resource Center, 1452 N. 7th Street. Common Council President and Housing Authority Board Chair Willie L. Hines, Jr., (a former Highland Park resident) served as keynote speaker and recognition awards were given to youth who achieved exceptional grade point averages and who have shown improvement in their studies over the past year. "This event showcases the achievements of our youth and the success of the

Education Initiative. Through regular attendance in school, hard work and the support of the Initiative, they are achieving their goals and preparing for a successful life," said Hines. The event marked the fifth year in a row with a 0% dropout rate among youth who participate in the Education Initiative. Additionally, 92% of high school seniors in the program graduated this spring. The Initiative currently works with 314 youth who live in the Highland Homes and Scattered Sites developments. In addition to the recognition they received from the Housing Authority and Chair Hines, graduates received congratulations from Mayor Tom Barrett. "These youth are the future leaders of the city, and there is no limit to what they can accomplish with a strong education," said Barrett. "The Education Initiative has helped provide a solid foundation for their continued success," said Barrett.

Since 2005, the HACM Education Initiative has sought to improve school attendance and educational achievement among youth at Highland Homes and Scattered Sites. "The Initiative strives to provide youth with an environment that consistently reinforces the importance of education and links them to resources that can help them accomplish their goals," said HACM Secretary-Executive Director Tony Pérez. Education Specialist Darrell Finch works with the children to ensure they attend school every day, links them to community learning centers and tutoring programs, and helps reduce barriers to their success in school. He also works one-on-one with parents to develop an educational achievement plan for each child.

"The kids inspire me every day, because they want a good life and they know that education is the key to achieving that goal," said Finch. HACM provides safe, high-quality and affordable housing to a diverse population of residents in over 4,000 public housing and 1,000 multi-family market rate rental units. In addition, HACM manages a

- In compliance with the terms and conditions of lease agreement


HIPPY PROGRAM (Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters)
