Open letter to my students,

"A Dream Without A Plan Is Only A Wish"

It's been eight years since the implementation of the Housing Authority of the City of Milwaukee Education Initiative and we have seen our high school graduation rate hover between 85% and 100%. I am elated to announce in 2012 the Education Initiative assisted students achieved an 88% high school graduation rate among our high school seniors. While we are elated with those results and have made tremendous progress, we still face tremendous challenges and an incredible amount of work. One of the goals of the Education Initiative is to ensure that after you graduate from high school that you are on par to compete in twenty-first century technology and globalization.

Each one of you will need to develop a plan and goal with realistic objectives to achieve those goals. And most importantly you will have to unearth the desire to follow up with action. Setting career goals consists of identifying clear objectives, plus the steps needed to achieve them. The main reason people do not achieve their dream is that they don't set any goals. In the 21st century, there are only two kinds of people, those who are educated and those who are not educated. Without a good education you have limited legal options for earning money. While obtaining good grades and testing are very important,

I don't want you to get discourage if you have not met your goals. Tests can't determine inventiveness, creativity, imagination, conceptual thinking, inquisitiveness, effort, judgment, commitment or a mass of other valuable attributes that you will need to compete globally. Making it in the real world today requires more than good grades. Today's jobs require workers to have a greater ability to think critically, be problem solvers, analytical thinkers, creative thinkers and the ability to work effectively in groups. It is estimated that 80% of the jobs created in the next decade will require some form of math and science skills. If you consciously believe that you have the ability to achieve your goals and you can hold a picture of those goals clearly in your mind long enough and hard enough, eventually your outer world will correspond with it. What's stopping you! There is a thinking process called "terminal thinking" that relates to young people not preparing for the future, because they might not foresee themselves in the future.

They are spending time engaging in various activities without having a clear plan in mind on what they want to accomplish. You have to without delay, disengage from spending all of your time watching meaningless media reality shows, engaging in pointless social networking such as; updating Facebook, emails, texting, mp3 players, spending time divulged in mind sedating computer games and excessive social celebrations, sports and partying. Yes, you are more connected in technology today that any other generation in history, but you are also more disconnected: you have lost a valuable skill, the ability to engage and connect with people.

I challenge you to flip the script; redirect your energies toward your goals; spend 75% of your time on homework and career goals and 25% on social homework. Your dreams will remain unattainable if you continue to spend 75% of your time socially networking. Focus on developing your interview and listening skills; sharpen your ability to hold a dynamic conversation and advance your reading and writing skills.

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to meet with you one on one throughout the years. Sometimes our meetings were not easy, but necessary. I enjoy listening as we set goals. Knowing that we have focused on your educational goals at those meetings regarding your personal endeavors makes me feel that there is aspiration and design for students in the Education Initiative.

A majority of people are walking the earth without direction because they have no plans, goals, or purpose. But for me, you are the reason why I strive to be a better educator: why I wake up each morning. I am here to provide support as you prepare to face the world. I am honored that you work with me and I will work hard not to fail you. Your enthusiasm to do better is my inspiration and the reason I am an educator.

Again, thank you for giving me a continued sense of fulfillment, a purpose and for furthering my passion for advocacy of education.


