Education Initiative Youth Power Breakfast

Parents and students braved the cold and snow on December 14, 2013, to attend the Education Initiative's Youth Power Breakfast at Highland Gardens. The presentation provided information and on-site registration into the pre-college programs that will take place in July, 2014. Students from the 8th through the 12th grade applied for scholarships offered through the Department of Public Instruction for the two week University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh Summer Pre-College Program. The DPI scholarship

covers full payment for the entire 2 weeks stay on campus, including tuition, meals, lodging, supplies,

insurance and activity fees. The residential program that are offered include programs in Nursing, Entrepreneurial Scholars, Science, Technology, and Engineering Education, Arts in the Media, and Enrichment Programs in math, speech, computer technology, multicultural awareness, career exploration and health and wellness. The Education Initiative promotes pre-college experiences and opportunities which enhance life skills, career planning and college preparation for HACM youth.






HOUSING AUTHORITY OF THE CITY OF MILWAUKEE SCHOLARSHIP FUND

You or your child can receive up to \$2,000 from HACM towards an accredited university or college, including a vocational/technical college.

Requirements

- Acceptance to a college or university
- Good academic standing with a grade point average of 2.0 or better
- Demonstrate financial need
- Enrolled in a degree program
- Compliance with the terms conditions of lease agreement
