HACM's Students tour UW-Whitewater

On September 29, 2014, in an effort to introduce students to the college environment, the Education Initiative organized a college tour to UW-Whitewater for 22 middle school and high school students. Jeannie Fenceroy, (standing in front)) Senior Program Officer, Greater Milwaukee Foundation met with students and talked about what they should look to get out of a college tour. The first stop was to McDonald's on E. North Avenue, where all the students were treated to a free breakfast meal. The group then toured some of the 400-acre campus on a beautiful warm day and met with representatives working in the fields of Business, Journalism, African-American Studies, Art, Engineering, and Chemistry. Admissions Counselors shared information on college life, scholarships opportunities, ACT/SAT scores, academic support services, campus dormitories, college applications, and enrollment. The tour also included one of the favorite activities of the youth: a trip to the all-you-can-eat lunch buffet at the University's Esker Dining Hall. Many youth have not been exposed to college and are unsure or uneasy about it. By letting your children go on college tours or experiences like this, it helps to get them interested in college and/or motivated about school in general.

HACM'S YOUTH LEARN FIRE SAFETY PLANNING

The HAI Group and HACM have once again helped spread the message of fire safety to youth and their families through their annual Fire Safety Poster Prevention Poster Contest during Fire Prevention Week, October 5-11. This year's theme was, "Working Smoke Alarms Save Lives-Test Yours Every Month!" 38 participants from this year's contest came from Highland Homes, Parklawn, Westlawn, Townhomes at Carver Park, Scattered Sites, and agency partners, including the Silver Spring Neighborhood Center, Pieper-Hillside Boys & Girls Club and Parklawn YMCA. The youth used fun facts about fire safety to develop their winning posters and winners in three age categories received cash awards (1st place: \$50; 2nd place: \$30; and 3rd place: \$20). Thanks to the contest judges from the Milwaukee Fire Department: Schuyler Belott (MFD Fire Lieutenant, Director of Community Relations) and Michael Ball (MFD Fire Fighter and Education Specialist). 
