The Summer Super Reading Challenge partnered again this year with the Milwaukee Public Library Super Reader Program. Starting on June 30, 2014, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., Monday through Thursday, elementary through high school students logged in minutes of



reading this summer at the Highland Gardens Neighborhood Network Computer Lab. Tracy Revels, Education Specialist Assistant spearheaded the summer program along with summer youth worker Deja Jones. A total of 23 students altogether garnered a total of 105 hours of reading. Students also enjoyed outings to the Milwaukee Public Library and the Chicago's Museum of Science & Industry. Students enjoyed nutritional lunches provided by the Social Development Commission (SDC) along with daily breaks at Dr. Martin Luther King Park provided relief to stretch and unwind after keeping their brains sharp during the summer break. Milwaukee Succeeds also provided a workshop, "Building on Books", for parents facilitated by Cheryl Ward that provided information on how to improve reading development and comprehension for young children. The Summer Reading Challenge was implemented to strengthen reading proficiency and to help encourage children to improve their reading throughout the summer in a fun and rewarding way. At the conclusion of the reading challenge, all participants were rewarded with Super Reader book bags, T-shirts, McDonald's gift certificates, Cousins Subs Coupons and a certificate of their accomplishments.

Poster Contest

This event is being sponsored by the Housing Authority Insurance Group (HAIG) to promote fire safety within the community. The Fire Prevention Poster Contest goal is to promote the importance of families developing and implementing a home fire escape plan. "Working Smoke Alarms Save Lives", is the theme of Fire Prevention Week, October 5-11, 2014. Judging will take place on October 8, 2014.

Youth from the Housing Authority of the City of Milwaukee and participating partners are encouraged to participate in the Fire Prevention 2014 Poster Contest. Participants must create a poster displaying fire prevention and safety around fire prevention. There are three age categories: 6-9, 10-14 and 15-18. A first, second, and third place winner will be selected from each age group. The first place winner will receive a check in the amount of \$50, second place winners receive \$30, and the third place winner will receive \$20.

It's not enough to have a home escape fire plan. To escape safely, you must make sure that everyone in the home has practiced the plan. For the month of October 2014, the Housing Authority advocates that when it comes to escape plans, practice is the key. With this in mind, the HAIG wants to make children aware of these potential hazards and teach them ways to prevent fires.
